CONTEXT

The budget establishes the borough's financial forecast for a fiscal year.

In Quebec, municipalities' fiscal years begin on January 1 and end on December 31.

All municipalities must produce a balanced operating budget, meaning that expenditures must equal all anticipated revenues.

Each year, the boroughs present their annual financial framework for the operating budget, as well as an investment plan for the next ten years.

SAFER, MORE ACTIVE NEIGHBOURHOODS



RENOVATIONS AND INNOVATIONS IN OUR PARKS AND SPORTS FACILITIES

- Installation of open-access toy boxes in Georges-Saint-Pierre, Notre-Dame-de-Grâce, Saidye-Bronfman, de la Savane and Nelson-Mandela parks
- Temporary pickleball courts in Parc Martin-Luther-King and Parc Warren-Allmand
- Addition of a basket for basketball at the Walkley Community Centre
- Upgrade of the baseball field in Parc Benny
- Renovation of the chalets in Parc Mackenzie-King and Parc Coffee have begun
- Play structures in Parc Benny made safer
- \ Upgrade of cricket facility at Parc Van Horne
- Improved access to washrooms in the chalets of Parc Nelson-Mandela, Parc de la Savane and Parc de la Confédération
- "De l'eau dans ma gourde" project: installation of water fountains in various parks



PROTECTING EACH STEP: MAKING IT SAFER TO GET AROUND



ROAD SAFETY MEASURES

- Construction of **96 speed bumps** and **37 curb extensions**
- Addition of 80 public benches
- Safety improvements near several educational and community buildings, including École primaire Sainte-Catherine-de-Sienne, Willingdon Elementary School Senior Campus, École Judith-Jasmin, École Félix-Leclerc, Centre de la petite enfance Ste-Justine and the Westhaven-Elmhurst Community Centre
- Improved bike routes: 2.6 km of new routes and safety enhancements to 9 km of existing routes
- The first bike crossing over the Décarie Expressway made safer with the new protected cycle path on Avenue Bourret
- Complete repaving of the arterial portion of Avenue Fielding
- Avenue Somerled: replacement of sewers and water mains, repaving, new sidewalks and addition of curb extensions
- Sewage and water main rehabilitation on Avenue Harvard between Rue Sherbrooke and Boulevard de Maisonneuve, including redevelopment with green and draining curb extensions



MORE DYNAMIC AND INCLUSIVE NEIGHBOURHOODS

HAND IN HAND: STRENGTHENING THE SOCIAL FABRIC

- **3% indexation** of funding to community organizations
- Recognition of 85 organizations offering services to the population in the borough
- Increased support for food banks
- Implementation of a youth outreach program
- Writing residencies for seniors and children who are learning French in the two Côte-des-Neiges libraries
- Newcomer services for refugee claimants
- Support to youth organizations for the planning and implementation of actions to prevent violence committed by and against young people

ATTRACTIVE AND LIVELY NEIGHBOURHOODS

- Over 100 cultural activities (festivals, film screenings, artistic offerings, etc.) in parks and other public spaces
- The first **Fête du vélo**
- The second autumn **Fête du Triangle**
- Beautified public spaces: six new public spaces, three parklets, four outdoor work stations, four spaces in parks
- Enhanced offer of winter activities, including festive lighting and decorations on commercial streets



BETTER SERVICE FOR THE PUBLIC AND FOR BUSINESSES

ENHANCEDS SERVICES TO THE POPULATION

- **Extended opening hours at the Accès Montréal office** from noon to 1 p.m. to improve service to the public
- New layout of the Accès Montréal office allowing for more efficient and pleasant customer service and better ergonomics for staff
- Centralization of calls to 311 to reduce wait times

SUPPORT FOR LOCAL BUSINESSES: PROSPERING TOGETHER

- Implementation of the new financial support **program for merchants' associations**
- Support for the creation of the new Chemin Queen-Mary merchants' association
- \$240,000 entrepreneurship contest for businesses on Rue Sherbrooke and Chemin Queen-Mary
- Faster issuance of occupancy permits for businesses



2023 KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

GREENER AND HEALTHIER NEIGHBOURHOODS

- **By-law amendments** to increase vegetation on private land
- Planting of a food forest in Parc Martin-Luther-King
- **800 trees planted** in 2023
- Planting of the borough's first microforest in Parc Mahatma-Gandhi
- Adoption and implementation of the 2024-2028 planting master plan (2024 planting target: 1,000 trees)





2023 KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

PROMOTING PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

- New accessibility and inclusion measures for **Borough Council meetings**
- Creation of a budget simulation exercise for residents: 3,505 visits and 232 participants
- The borough's 2023 participatory budget: **151 ideas transformed into 51 projects**, still in progress
- Final consultation phase for the Local Transportation Plan

MORE EQUITABLE AND INCLUSIVE LIVING ENVIRONMENTS

- Modern, accessible parks and sports facilities:
 - Development of a master plan for parks
 - Renovation of the swimming pool in the Centre sportif Côte-des-Neiges
 - Playground improvements at the NDG YMCA park
 - Complete renovation of Parc Mackenzie-King
 - Resurfacing of tennis courts at Parc Warren-Allmand
 - **Renovation of the chalet** in Parc Van Horne
 - Renovation of the chalet and splash pad at Parc Jean-Brillant
 - Replacement of sports equipment and renovation of the large pavilion in Parc Martin-Luther-King
 - Construction of a new skatepark at Parc Benny
 - Addition of lighting in Roméo-Charrette, Paul-Doyon and Warren-Allmand parks

MORE EQUITABLE AND INCLUSIVE LIVING ENVIRONMENTS

- Cultural vitality: production of a local cultural development plan
- More support for our community organizations: additional 3% financial indexation for the second consecutive year
- A neighbourhood for the future: development of the planning and development master plan (PDAD) for the Namur-Hippodrome eco-neighbourhood and public consultation
- Creater food security: an urban agriculture site on the green roof of the Côte-des-Neiges library and cultural centre and temporary urban agriculture sites on vacant lots
- \ Handling the housing crisis: increased support for community housing groups





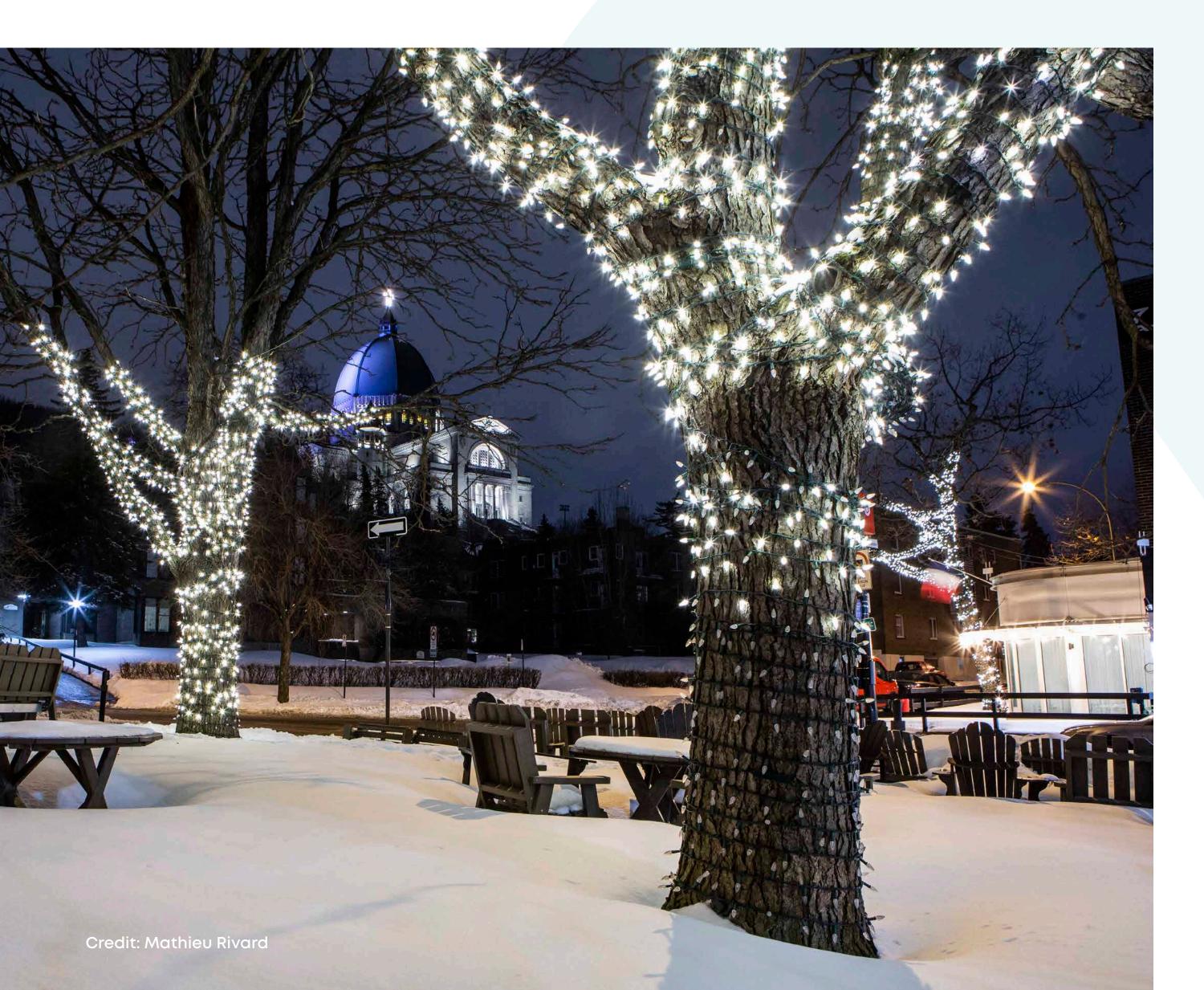
HEALTHY AND SUSTAINABLE LIVING ENVIRONMENTS

- Accelerating the development of our cycling network: creation of a position dedicated to bike path creation and safety
- **Four seasons of entertainment in neighbourhoods:** festive lighting in parks and along commercial arteries, holiday markets and entertainment, outdoor programming throughout the year, \$100,000 in funding for local and community projects
- More trees: the implementation of an ambitious planting master plan to reduce impervious surfaces in highly paved areas and heat islands, in addition to increasing the planting of microforests
- Creener, more beautiful streets: the addition of a greening team, composed of eight gardeners, to plant vegetation in our curb extensions and promote urban biodiversity
- Traffic calming around schools: increased measures to reduce vehicle speeds near schools to protect our children
- Cleaner and more peaceful streets: new, stronger by-laws on nuisances and noise

ECONOMIC VITALITY

- \$326,800 budget for economic development
- Support for pedestrianization of commercial streets
- Implementation of a **Zero Waste Challenge** program with merchants
- Financial support for the creation of new merchants' associations
- Greater efforts to beautify our commercial streets (relaxation areas, lighting, cleanliness)

PROMOTING PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

- Local participatory budget: \$500,000 per year set aside to fund projects proposed by residents like you
- Have your say: Continued consultations with the public and non-profit organizations, including the new local cultural development plan

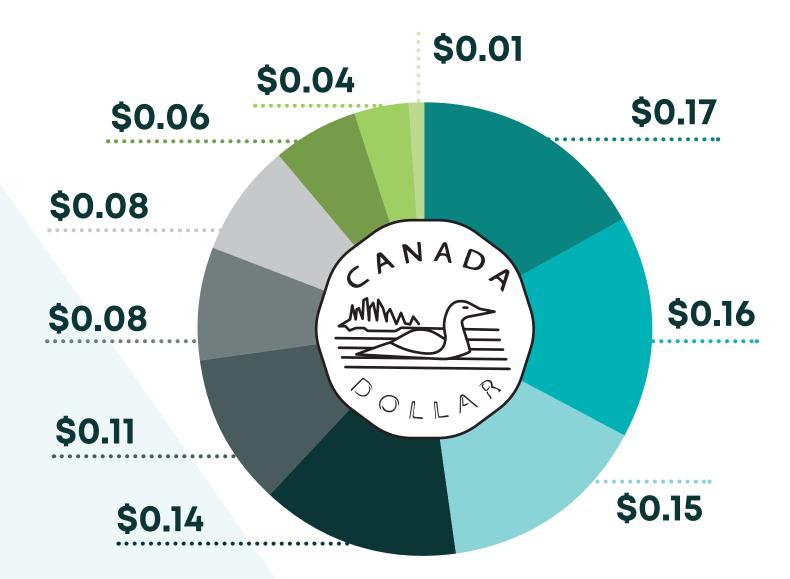

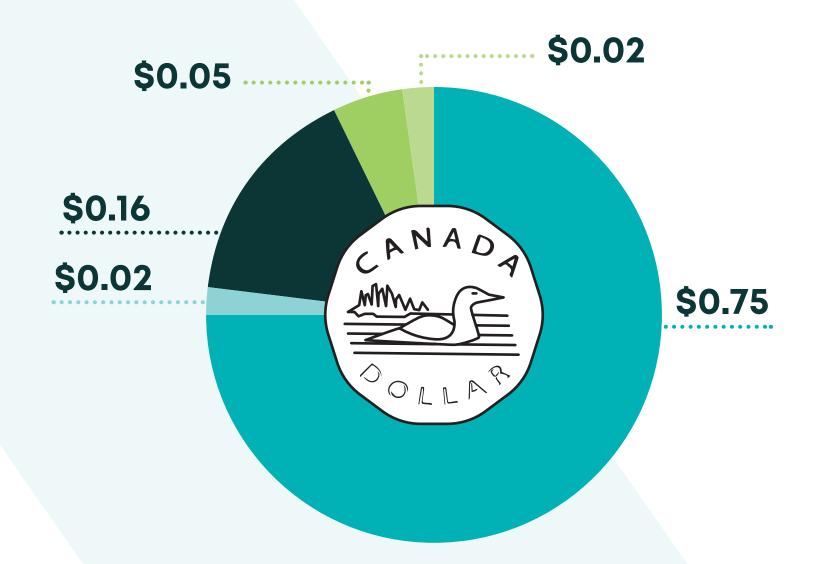

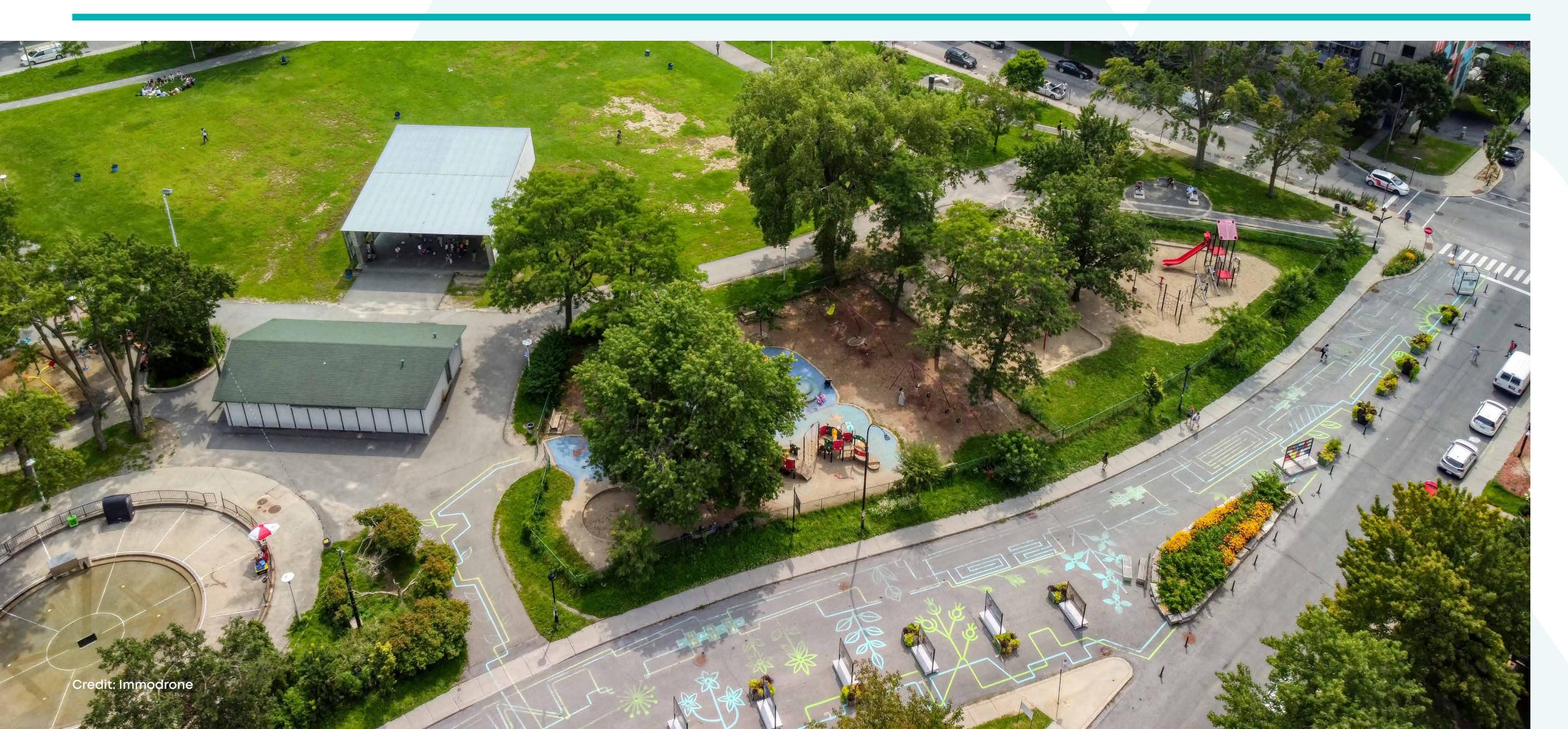

2024-2033 TEN-YEAR CAPITAL WORKS PROGRAM (TYCWP)



IN 2024-2033, \$68.3 MILLION OF OUR TYCWP WILL BE ALLOCATED AS FOLLOWS:

- \$29.0 million for local road improvements
- \$24.7 million for building protection
- \$14.6 million for park redevelopment

To ensure the completion of priority projects under borough jurisdiction, other investments and funding sources will be added:

Additional borough funding:

- Over \$10 million from the surpluses allocated to several high-priority capital projects
- \$7.9 million from the borough parks fund

Additional funding from the Central City:

- \$7.0 million from the Montréal aquatic program (PAM)
- \$2.0 million from the green economy and decarbonization plan for municipal buildings (PEV-DIM)
- \$6.0 million from the Ville de Montréal's outdoor sports facility program (PISE)
- \$2.3 million from the library renovation, expansion and construction program (RAC)
- \$1.4 million from the program to upgrade cultural centres
- \$0.4 million from projects accepted into the program to protect buildings under local jurisdiction (PPICL)

Additional funding from the provincial and federal governments:

\$7.6 million from the recreational and sports infrastructure financial assistance program (PAFIRS)

GLOSSARY

Operating budget

The operating budget is for the management of the borough's day-to-day business: it covers the costs related to service provision and residents' quality of life, such as recreation, community services and waste collection and transportation.

Ten-year capital works program (TYCWP)

It covers the investment projects that the borough plans to carry out over the next ten years to maintain its local streets, buildings, parks and community and sports facilities. Various funding sources are required for these investments, including long-term loans.

Borough revenue

Income from the various fee-based services offered by the borough, as provided for in the by-laws, like permits, room rentals and public property occupancy.

Central transfers

Budget transfers determined by the Ville de Montréal. These transfers represent an important source of operating budget funding for the boroughs. In 2024, transfers from the central city accounted for 75% of the borough's overall operating budget funding.

Local service tax

Amount administered by the borough, collected through property taxes. The service tax is one of the sources of funding for the borough's operating budget.

Local investment tax

Amount administered by the borough, collected through property taxes. This tax is the main source of funding for the borough's capital projects.
